FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR LAURIE

"Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good..." (Romans 12:9)

Dear People of God,

When Jesus was asked which of God's commandments is the greatest, he answered, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, and with all your soul, and with all your mind, and with all your strength" (Mark 12:30). Then he added, "the second is this, 'You shall love your neighbor as yourself'" (v.31). Jesus—the good rabbi—was pretty clear: Love God. Love neighbor.

In today's world, we, who seek to follow in the footsteps of Jesus, would do well to heed those words and proclaim them boldly. With the exception of *hating* evil, hate—such as intolerance for those who differ from us—has no place in our communities, our schools, our homes, or in places faithful people gather to offer God their worship and praise. In Paul's letter to the Christians in Rome, he writes of the marks of the true Christian, reminding them (and us!) "Let love be genuine; hate what is evil, hold fast to what is good..."

Recently Rabbi Ruhi of Temple Beth Israel forwarded an email she received from Jessica Anderson, the Regional Security Advisor for Oregon and SW Washington. It said,

Earlier this year, a Telegram channel for an antisemitic group began advertising for a national day of hate which is being publicized as Saturday, February 25th, 2023. The intent of the day is to use the tactics of banner drops, stickers, flyers, and graffiti. SCN is not aware of specific cities that may be targeted in this upcoming campaign and national events like this have been coordinated before. It's difficult to gauge ahead of time how extensive or widespread the participation will be.

Upon receiving Rabbi Ruhi's email, and following local news reports of a spike of antisemitic flyers being posted in the Thurston neighborhood of Springfield, and areas of Eugene, Deacon Clare brought this disturbing matter to the attention of our Lutheran rostered ministers who gather for text study each week. Once again, she shared, our local Jewish communities are faced with anxiety and fear. In response, we are gathering to stand vigil in solidarity outside Temple Beth Israel for their morning prayer service this Saturday (2/25). If you would like to join us in one of two shifts: 9:45-11am or 11-12:15pm, you can reach out to Deacon Clare (206.683.2921). Due to security measures TBI has in place, all participants need to be identified by us. In other words, they ask that we tell our people not to just show up. Therefore, early Saturday morning, Deacon Clare will alert everyone who reaches out to her of any final details for our participation.

Given the short notice, obviously some who may wish to be present will be unable to do so. In that case, you can join us in prayer from wherever you may be. My devotional prayer suggestion for this season of Lent is from Psalm 51: "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a right spirit with me." With Paul, I also encourage us to hate what is evil and hold fast to what is good, not just this Saturday, and not just during the season of Lent, but in every season of our lives. Let us continually strive to follow Jesus' teachings by loving God and our neighbors.

“For I long to see you so that I may share with you some spiritual gift so that you may be strengthened—or rather so that we may be mutually encouraged by each other’s faith, both yours and mine.”
Romans 1:11-12

Dear friends and members of Central,

The verse above is from the letter Paul writes to the church in Rome. Unlike most of Paul’s letters, this is one he writes to a community that he does not already know. He hopes to meet them and be supported by them as he heads further West on a missionary journey into Spain (Rom 15:24). As a result, much of the letter of Romans is not responding to a particular situation, but instead is simply Paul introducing himself and how he understands the Gospel. Paul is telling his story. He talks about his experience and his understanding of who Jesus is in his life. You see above that Paul hopes to meet the members of the church in Rome and for each of them to strengthen each other’s faith by sharing their stories with each other. Paul calls sharing their stories the “sharing of a spiritual gift.”

During the season of Lent, we will have some new opportunities to share our story, as Central Lutheran Church. God is working in amazing ways in our community. One of the ways we will be doing that is through a new Lenten daily devotional. Starting at Ash Wednesday you have seen a daily devotional that is posted on the church website and on our Facebook page with daily devotions that are written by members of Central. These short devotions include a Bible verse, a short reflection, a picture, and a prayer. These are from the people of Central for the people of Central. During Lent I encourage you to go through these devotions each day.

Second, if you have been in a ministry team you might have seen someone showing up with an iPad camera at your meetings. We are taking some video footage and creating 2-5 minute video clips of some of the many and various ministries at Central. These will be shown during our Adult Education hour between services (and might be used in other ways later). Through these videos we can *see* aspects of our story in new ways.

We are doing these things in order to help tell our story. We hope the same thing that Paul hoped – that this will result in a strengthening of our faith through mutual encouragement. Christ is alive in this community and the more we hear that, the more we are enlivened. It is the spiritual gift Paul is talking about – sharing our stories of how Christ is alive within us and through us.

First Place Family at the Annex

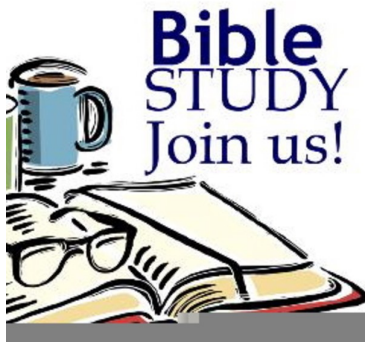

January Meeting

The Church Council met on Jan. 17, 2023

Properties Report: There have been necessary repairs to the South Wall of the Sanctuary replacing dry-rotted portions of the wall. The first stage has been completed, further assessment will come to determine the extent of the damage.

Action Items:

The Church Council approved the motion to recommend the proposed 2023 budget to the congregation to be voted upon at the Semi-Annual meeting on January 29, 2023.

February Meeting

Properties Report: The necessary repairs to the South Wall of the Sanctuary continue. We have received the bid for the entire project and the total cost is estimated to cost approximately \$35,000. Of that, \$18,000 has already been paid as the first stage work has been completed, the remainder is forthcoming as further work remains to be done. There is hope this will be the full extent of the damage that needs to be repaired.

Action Items:

The Church Council approved the motion to accept the bid of \$13,500 for the larger "monument sign" to be installed at the entrance to the East Parking Lot.

BOOK CLUB NEWS



The CLC Book Club will meet via Zoom on Monday, March 13, 2023, at 7:00pm to discuss The Black Church: This Is Our Story, This Is Our Song by Henry Louis Gates, Jr. "For the young Henry Louis Gates, Jr., growing up in a small, residentially segregated West Virginia town, the church was a center of gravity—an intimate place where voices rose up in song and neighbors gathered to celebrate life's blessings and offer comfort amid its trials and tribulations. In this tender and expansive reckoning with the meaning of the Black Church in America, Gates takes us on a journey spanning more than five

centuries, from the intersection of Christianity and the transatlantic slave trade to today's political landscape. At road's end, and after Gates's distinctive meditation on the churches of his childhood, we emerge with a new understanding of the importance of African American religion to the larger national narrative—as a center of resistance to slavery and white supremacy, as a magnet for political mobilization, as an incubator of musical and oratorical talent that would transform the culture, and as a crucible for working through the Black community's most critical personal and social issues. "The Black Church has always been more than a sanctuary ...It has never been only one thing. Its story lies at the heart of the Black political struggle, and it has produced many of the Black community's most notable leaders. At the same time, some churches and denominations have eschewed political engagement and exemplified practices of exclusion and intolerance that have caused polarization and pain. Those tensions remain today, as a rising generation demands freedom and dignity for all within and beyond their communities, regardless of race, sex, or gender. Still, as a source of faith and refuge, spiritual sustenance and struggle against society's darkest forces, the Black Church has been central, as this enthralling history makes vividly clear." (Barnes & Noble Overview) The discussion will be led by Gary Wolfe.
