

Dear Friends in Christ,

"Do not be afraid." The Lord God Almighty said it. Angels said it. Moses said it. Joseph said it. David said it. Prophets said it. Jesus said it. Throughout the scriptures, in a variety of situations, those words: "Do not be afraid" or "Fear Not!" were spoken time and time again.

Speaking for God the Prophet Isaiah declared, "Do not fear, for I am with you, do not be afraid, for I am your God; I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my victorious right hand." (Isaiah 41:10).



Jesus himself said it, "Do not let your hearts be troubled. Believe in God, believe also in me." (John 14:1) And again, "Do not be afraid, little flock, for it is your Father's good pleasure to give you the kingdom." (Luke 12:32)

"Do not be afraid." I know, easier said than done. Many of us live in fear. We may not be afraid for our lives, as some are. We may not be afraid that our personal safety is at risk or that we are lacking what is needed for daily life. Still, many of us spend an inordinate amount of time worrying about things that may never happen. And frankly, even if they do happen, experience tells us often things don't turn out nearly as badly as we feared or imagined. Fears can immobilize us. Shut us down. Consume our thoughts. Shake our faith. Fear feeds on fear, often to the point of overwhelming us. This is as true for us today as it was for people in biblical times.

That is why you will continue to hear words of comfort and hope coming from my lips. Trust in the promise: your future, our future is secure. God is with us in the present—here and now—and God will be with us every step of the way as we journey through life—now and forever.

May that word of hope and promise sustain you, comfort you, and fill you with God's peace, the peace that surpasses all understanding. "Do not be afraid!"

Dear friends and members of Central,

This verse appears in our lectionary for our Fourth Sunday after Pentecost on July 3. Jesus is sending seventy of his disciples out to heal the sick and proclaim the kingdom of God. Jesus sends disciples out in a variety of places in the Gospels, here, though what makes it different is Jesus' language of harvest. There are a variety of ways to think about the theme of harvest, but I want to focus on just one way of possibly thinking about it. Harvest has within it the sense of abundance. The crops have already been planted, they've already grown, and now the labor that Jesus charges them with is to gather. It reminds us of when Paul said, "I planted, Apollos watered, but God did the growing" (1 Cor 3:6). The message is that the work of God in our world is God's work, not our own. The work we do is, in fact, God's work through us. As Lutherans we use the term "the means of grace" – our being the means of God's grace in the world – or in language closer to home - becoming the hands and feet of Jesus.

These followers that Jesus sent out report how well their message was received (10:17). There is no suggestion that the people they encountered already had heard of Jesus – instead, it was God's work – the crop had already grown and was ready for harvest. It suggests the kind of opportunities that are among us in the world – the harvest in our own world and our own contexts.

As I write this, though, it can be hard to see that harvest already grown. In the past few weeks, especially after the most recent Supreme Court rulings, we have seen how deeply divided our society is and how those divisions have been expressed in people's deep emotions. In the wake of the pandemic, we have felt deeply the pain and suffering of isolation. As it has become far more safe to gather together, we recognize what we missed in each other's lives over the past two years.

Where is the harvest here? I grew up on a farm and I remember, even as a child, that harvest time was exciting because it was when we would reap the benefits of the summer's work, but it also was incredibly chaotic. There was no great gain without some loss. It was a time of anxiety and not knowing precisely what to do – would the weather hold out for the kind of work we needed to do? How could we organize enough people to be here at the right time so that we could bring the harvest in? Sometimes the harvest was very good – others times it was not. It was hard to predict. We would never know exactly what would happen next. Every growing season brings its own surprises – some good, and some bad.

That kind of harvest is the kind Jesus is talking about. It is the kind that is unpredictable. The kind where Jesus is presenting us opportunities that we cannot imagine. God is not done with us yet. The opportunities continue to arise and live in us daily. I write this as one who has been called by you to be your Associate Pastor. None of us know precisely what the future will hold for me or for Central. There are some things we can probably expect, and other things that will come up we could not have anticipated. I am excited, though, to find out how God's grace will appear in our lives together as a community. It might at times look messy and chaotic, and other times look well executed and ordered, but it will always be full of the grace and love of God in our community together.
