#### FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR LAURIE

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We conclude our Lenten journey and begin Holy Week on Palm Sunday reminded of Jesus' triumphant entry into Jerusalem where crowds of people waved branches as they shouted, "Hosanna to the Son of David! Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord! Hosanna in the highest heaven!" (Matthew 21:9)

We move to Maundy Thursday where Jesus shared the Passover meal with his disciples on the night of his betrayal. We are reminded that on that night Jesus "took a loaf of bread, and after blessing it he broke it, gave it to the disciples, and said, 'Take, eat; this is my body.' Then he took a cup, and after giving thanks he gave it to them, saying, 'Drink from it, all of you; for this is my blood of the covenant, which is poured out for many for the forgiveness of sins.'" (Matthew 26:26-28)

We arrive at Good Friday where in the evening we will gather in worship to remember Jesus' betrayal, arrest, trial, and crucifixion. And this year, at our Prayer Vigil in the chapel, we pause to remember that "from noon on, darkness came over the whole land until three in the afternoon. And about three o'clock Jesus cried with a loud voice, 'Eli, Eli, lama sabachthani?' that is, 'My God, my God, why have you forsaken me?' (Matthew 27:45-46)

Then, once again, we will gather in worship to celebrate the day of our Lord's resurrection on that first Easter morning—as we do each and every Sunday, week in, and week out. We will join our voices with Christians all around the world with shouts of "Alleluia! Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen, indeed! Alleluia!"

However, if you are unable to be present with us in the flesh, let me remind you that we remain united as the body of Christ. Our hope rests solely on God's love which has been poured out for us in Christ's death and resurrection! In the words of the Apostle Paul, "Therefore we have been buried with him by baptism into death, so that, just as Christ was raised from the dead by the glory of the Father, so we too might walk in newness of life. For if we have been united with him in a death like his, we will certainly be united with him in a resurrection like his." (Romans 6:4-5)

Let us live then, as Easter people, trusting that together we are the body of Christ, called, sent, and empowered by the Spirit to carry on Christ's mission and to share God's redeeming and reconciling love for all people, of all times, and in all places. And no matter where we are, let us raise our voices in shouts of: "Alleluia! Christ is Risen! Christ is Risen, indeed. Alleluia!"

#### FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR BEN

"After the sabbath, as the first day of the week was dawning, Mary Magdalene and the other Mary went to see the tomb. And suddenly there was a great earthquake; for an angel of the Lord, descending from heaven, came and rolled back the stone and sat on it." Matt. 28:1-2

Dear members of the body of Christ at Central,

This year, we are in the year of the Gospel of Matthew and we will be reading, on Easter Sunday, the resurrection narrative as the Gospel of Matthew depicts it. I have included two of the verses of that story above. In all of the Gospels some women come to Jesus' tomb, but only here in Matthew do the women themselves see the angel descend and see the rock sealing the tomb get rolled away. In the other Gospel narratives, the women arrive and the stone is already rolled away and they meet the angel who is already there. Here in Matthew, though, they see it happen before them.

There are any number of possibilities as to why the Gospel of Matthew has chosen to emphasize this. It could be because Matthew wants to emphasize that the cause of the stone rolling away was from God and not from some other source. It could be so that it shows the dramatic action of God in the world. I would like to suggest another possible reading. The Gospel of Matthew is emphasizing the way the resurrection of Jesus is observed in the world. The women observe the angel descending and the stone rolled away. They see it, they feel it, they can touch it.

We are not there in the year 30 CE to see the stone rolled away, but where we can we observe the resurrection of Jesus in our lives? Where can we concretely experience who Jesus is? We have been doing that through our entire Lenten journey as we have concretely heard and seen the stories of one another. In our midweek Lenten series, we have heard the faith stories of several of our members. In our Lenten Daily Devotional, we have seen and heard the deep meaning and purpose our body of Christ at Central has in sharing their devotions. In our video series of various ministries at Central, we have seen and heard the way that God inspires us to be engaged together as a community. As we enter into Holy Week, we will be seeing and hearing Christ's journey into Jerusalem, in the Last Supper, on Good Friday, and on Easter Sunday.

The resurrection is not just something that was seen and heard one time a long time ago. It is seen and heard every day in the lives of one another. I have been inspired and deeply moved seeing and hearing your faith during this Lenten journey. Thank you all for your sharing of yourselves, your faith, and for being the hands and feet of Jesus to one another.
