FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR LAURIE

Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

It would be difficult, if not impossible, to share all of the highlights of my summer sabbatical, but I will share one of the most surprising experiences... On July 2, I was in Trondheim, Norway worshiping at the National (Lutheran) Cathedral (founded in 1070AD, completed around 1300AD). I wasn't expecting to see many worshipers in attendance. After all, for years I've been hearing about declining church attendance in Northern European (and US) churches. Besides, it was a beautiful summer day!

Yet, to my surprise, the 1850 seat cathedral was packed with worshipers. Granted it turned out to be World Mission Sunday with Bishops from multiple countries (Indonesia, Madagascar, Japan, Mali, et. al) in attendance, but still... It struck me how easy it is to listen to the voices crying out about the demise of the Church, particularly those churches labeled "mainline," "liturgical," and/or "traditional." You know what I mean—churches like Central Lutheran.

The title of a recent blog in *The Atlantic* gave me pause. "Why So Many Americans Have Stopped Going to Church" (Isabel Fattal; August 3, 2023). While pointing to the decline in church attendance over the past several decades, the article stated, "The decline is not just about religious institutions; it's about society itself. Equally troubling the article asks, "Are Americans losing their ability to incorporate religion—or any kind of intentional community—into their lives?" Jake Meador, the editor in chief of the quarterly magazine *Mere Orthodoxy* proposes that churches could better serve their members by asking more of them. He asserts: "A vibrant, life-giving church requires more, not less, time and energy from its members. It asks people to prioritize one another over our career, to prioritize prayer and time reading scripture over accomplishment ... Churches could model better, truer sorts of communities, ones in which the hungry are fed, the weak are lifted up, and the proud are cast down. Creating an environment where people can ask more of one another, and give more in turn, seems like a wise rule of thumb for any community. If only American life didn't make such a prospect feel so daunting."

Perhaps he's on to something. First and foremost, our primary purpose as a body of Christ is to gather in worship to praise and glorify God, to be fed and nourished at Christ's table, to hear the word of God and to support one another as siblings drawn together in community. Then, having been strengthened for the journey, we are called to: love one another, nurture faithful living, serve those in need, and share the gospel.

Central needs you! We need each other! Your presence in worship... Your gifts of time, talents, and treasure... Your whole heart, mind, body... All of you! And so, as we launch into another program year, I'd like to invite you to increase your participation in our life together. May we individually and collectively strive to grow more fully into faithful living and generous giving... All to the glory of God!

FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR BEN

"For whatever was written in former days was written for our instruction, so that by steadfastness and by the encouragement of the scriptures we might have hope." Rom. 15:4

Dear members of the body of Christ at Central,

We have had a wondrous Summer which included among other things our Garden Worship, Vacation Bible School, Season of Creation and closing out our Summer with our study of Civic Life and Faith. One of the main things we emphasized in the Season of Creation is that all has become new (2 Cor. 5:17) and that the new life in Christ is for us right now as we remain rooted in God's living soil. In the Season of Creation we celebrated that – how wondrous is this new creation we live in and the way God provides for us new opportunities every day. The study in our Civic Life and Faith class has caused many people to see the same thing not as optimistically – reflecting on our civic life and the way discourse is happening between people on both sides of the political aisle – we see new things, and we aren't so sure we like them. Some of us aren't sure what to make of this "new" world around us, and we feel discouraged and exhausted.

Part of the challenge we have been wrestling through in our Civic Life and Faith class is simply that our world today is so different than the world of the Reformation from where much of our theology comes not to mention the world of the New Testament or Old Testament. Most notably for our class, even the very idea of democracy was not in their worldview. We simply live in different times and different places. It leads some to question if our scriptures and sacred traditions speak to a new world. If so, how?

As we look at our scriptures and traditions, though, we find amazing application to a new situation in a new world. Paul reminds us in Romans 15 above the scriptures written in a very different time and place (in his case, the Old Testament as related to his first century world) were written for our instruction and in order to provide us hope. That was just as true then as now. The new creation we are in Christ makes alive the scripture in our hearts for a new day.

Beginning on September 12, our Together Tuesday programming will kick off again. In the adult class we will be beginning a series called "a new church, a new world." In it, we will be talking about how we relate to the world around us as Biblical Lutheran Christians in 2023. Just as the world around us is new, so too are we the new creation in Christ and we will talk about how we can reflect that identity in the world around us. Please join us!



acknowledgements, Ms. Kingsolver says, "I'm grateful to Charles Dickens for writing David Copperfield, his impassioned critique of institutional poverty and its damaging effects on children in his society. Those problems are still with us." The discussion will be led by Meg Hicks. Looking Ahead: The CLC Book Club will meet via Zoom on Monday, Oct. 9, 2023, at 7:00pm to discuss *The Indifferent Stars Above: The Harrowing Saga of the Donner Party* by Daniel James Brown.
