FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR LAURIE

Dear Brothers & Sisters in Christ,

Prior to Pastor Ben, Deacon Clare, and myself each receiving our respective calls to serve with and alongside you, the congregation created a new mission statement: to be the hands and feet of Jesus by loving God and one another; nurturing faithful living; serving those in need; and sharing the Gospel. In my time with you I've viewed this statement not merely as words on a page, but as a guide for us to live more fully into our identity as the baptized people of God. People, who, empowered by the gifts of the Holy Spirit, are being called, equipped, and strengthened to embody Christ and God's vision to love, nurture, serve, and share.

To that end, I've reminded you time and time again how we are continually being blessed by God—blessed to be a blessing! I give thanks to God for Central's rich history and for the many and varied ways each of you share your gifts of time, talents, and treasures. The following pages speak to some of the ways we are living into our shared identity in this time and place. But, I will also highlight a few...

In addition to Sunday morning worship and education, new and expanding ministries continue to evolve. For example, "Cradle to Crayons" for preschoolers and their families gather monthly for mutual support and playtime for the children; starting this month a new opportunity for our elders to gather for a "Mid-week Coffee Hour" will be offered on the 2nd & 4th Wednesdays of the month from 1-2pm; "Next Chapter," for those experiencing the loss of a spouse meets on the 2nd Thursday of the month; our "*Quilting Ministry*" meets on the 1st & 3rd Thursdays; "Children's Chapel" is being incorporated into our worship life; "Stephen Ministry" will begin training new Stephen Ministers starting in January; our "Together Tuesdays" includes a community meal followed by music and education for all ages; "Music Ministry," including the Chorale, Handbell Ensemble, and Children's Choir have resumed weekly rehearsals and our children's choir has now been expanded to include older youth as "Junior Cantors" who are being trained to serve as worship leaders and the "Music **Together**" program hosted at Central is currently offering seven classes each week, with 58 children enrolled (accompanied by a parent/grandparent); "Campus *Ministry*" is reaching out to UO/LCC students with Hearth & Table and new and returning Christus House residents are living and growing together in intentional Christian community; "Central, United, & Emmaus (CUE)" continues to collaborate in providing ministry to children, youth and families as well as congregation-wide events (see p. 8); and opportunities abound to *serve those in need* (see p. 6) and nurture faithful living (see p. 7).

All of which is to point out the obvious, and that is that these are just some of the ways we are seeking to live into our mission of being the hands and feet of Jesus. We—each and every one of us—are the Church together. Thanks be to God!

FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR BEN

"Do not remember the former things, or consider the things of old. I am about to do a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it?" Isaiah 43:18-19

Dear members of the body of Christ at Central,

The passage above from the second part of the book of Isaiah, written in the 6th century BC, is speaking to a community in Israel who has returned from exile in Babylon to discover life simply would not be the same as it used to be. Those who had been taken captive and lived through exile had hoped they would return and have the nation of Israel like they did when David was king. When they did return, though, they were met with disappointment. First, many people didn't return at all. Many remained in "diaspora" (dispersion throughout the world). Second, when they returned rather than having a nation, they found themselves with a client government ruled by the foreign Persian empire. What's more, the communities that were established were small and never compared to what the nation once was. Further, they even found other people already living there who also felt they were historic ancestors of the land and weren't very interested in this "new nation." In short, the challenges they faced were ones that they could never have imagined before. As such, the prophecy is that God is doing a new thing with them. What was once the case is now fundamentally different. The passage assures the people that while God is doing a new thing, God has not changed and God has not abandoned them. God is simply working in new ways. It was then up to them to reframe their expectations and rethink what it meant to be the people of God.

In 2023 in Eugene, we are also facing some new realities of what it means to be the church in this society. Our upheaval and rethinking are nothing in comparison to what Israel faced in the 6th century, but we can take some inspiration from them. We can recognize that God is doing new things in new spaces. While the world around us has changed (and is always changing), rather than that being something to lament, it instead provides us new and exciting opportunities. Our Tuesday evening education class is called "A New Church, A New World" and is talking about many of those opportunities in the Pacific Northwest. First, understanding where we are in our current religious landscape and then seeing what fresh and exciting options this opens up for us. If any of you are not able to make it to church on Tuesday nights, the new video series, "Theology Bits with Pastor Ben" are lessons in miniature that we will be covering. They can be found on Central's YouTube channel, Central's Facebook page, or in the Weekly Events email.

In addition to the class, our Lutherwood Congregational Retreat Day partnering with United and Emmaus is also going to be on this same topic – what are the simple realities of religiosity in the Pacific Northwest (often called the "None Zone") and what new opportunities does that provide for us? The theme is that Christ is present and acts in every age, including our own. It is up to us to see how we can be the hands and feet of Jesus in this space and this time. Please join us!




JOIN US FOR A CONGREGATIONAL RETREAT DAY SATURDAY, OCTOBER 21st CAMP LUTHERWOOD

THANK YOU FOR YOUR GENEROUSITY

A Special Meeting of the Congregation was held way back on Sunday, April 16th to inform the congregation of several pressing building repairs and projects that surfaced after we had approved our 2023 annual budget in January. At that meeting we voted to authorize the use of up to \$150,000 from our Capital Reserves to complete all of the necessary work. However, due to an outpouring of "above & beyond" giving, not only were we able to complete all of the projects, we wound up only needing to transfer \$5,205 from our Reserves.
