FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR BEN

"As you therefore have received Christ Jesus the Lord, continue to walk in him, rooted and built up in him and established in the faith, just as you were taught, abounding in thanksgiving." Colossians 2:6-7

Dear fellow members of God's creation at Central,

We are in the midst of a new "Season of Creation" which Central, United, and Emmaus Lutheran have all incorporated within our "Season after Pentecost." In that Season of Creation we have as our overarching theme, "Rooted in God's Living Soil." We are doing quite a bit of observation and thinking of what it means to be "rooted." This metaphor in Scripture has many implications. For this brief letter, I'd like just to recognize three aspects: roots ground and strengthen; roots nourish; roots intertwine with others.

Roots ground and strengthen us. We see the massive trees that stand hundreds of feet up and we understand that they can only stand and continue to live because of the roots below them. They are incredibly resilient to weather and damage so long as those roots below, that largely remain hidden from view, remain healthy and strong. In the Colossians text above, we are rooted in Christ. That can sometimes be hidden amidst the challenges we face in life, but it is always present. It is what grounds our beings and provides us the hope to continue.

Roots nourish us. We are rooted and built up in Christ – established in faith. The faith of Christ is not something that just nourishes us so that we can live, it enlivens us so that we can act. Notice the language in Col 2:7: "continue to walk in him" – usually moving around and walking is not tied to being "rooted" – yet, that is precisely what Paul says in Colossians. The roots we have in Christ nourish us so much that they empower us to be able to move and act in the world, not just stay standing in one place. That's how rich the nourishment we get from our rooting in Christ is – it causes us to act toward others in the very same grace we have received.

Roots intertwine with others. The very large trees we see in the world do not just stand because their roots are vast. In addition to the roots being vast, the very large trees' roots intertwine with the roots of all the trees around them. It is not just about one strong tree, but instead about the entire forest. Being rooted in Christ is further being rooted in all those others who also are in Christ. We are a community of faith. Being rooted in Christ is being rooted in one another.

And so we conclude alongside the apostle Paul "abounding in thanksgiving" for this creation. In Christ is our grounding, our nourishment, and our community. I pray this Season of Creation has helped us all see that.

SEASON OF CREATION



Quilting Needs




All are welcome to join the quilting ministry team! Join us for quilting the first and third Thursdays of the month. No experience necessary. Call the office for more information.
