#### FROM THE DESK OF PASTOR BEN

"Now the Lord said to Abram, 'Go from your country and your kindred and your father's house to the land that I will show you." Gen. 12:1

Dear family of God at Central,

These past several weeks as we have celebrated the birth of Christ at Christmas as a community and in our families, we have gathered with many whom we might not have seen in some time. It has also been a time for our beloved traditions and the deep meanings associated with them. It is a time that invites us to reflect on continuity and change.

On the one hand, there is tremendous continuity in tradition. We continue worshiping the same God Abraham worshiped. We proclaim the same incarnate Christ the Shepherds proclaimed only hours after Christ's birth. And yet, on the other hand, we know that there is change. We don't proclaim the precise same way they did. Those changes, though, do not challenge the fact that this is the same God and our worship is in continuity with all those who have gone before us. In the passage above, God appears to Abraham and presents Abraham with a completely new thing – that worship of God is going to have something to do with a specific place – the land of Canaan. Nothing in Genesis 1-11 would have prepared Abraham for that. And after Abraham arrives in the land, his worship of God his God is related to the land he lives in. Nothing would have prepared him for that either.

Abraham is "being religious" in a completely new way. Further, it turns out being the family of Abraham means something – and the religion is tied into his family life. Again, something completely new. Yet, Abraham is also in connection with those from Genesis 1-11. Abraham worships the same God Noah and Methusaleh did. He addresses God the same way they did. God communicates and relates to Abraham just as God did to them. So that while there is something new, it also is expressing something that is not new at all.

In our Tuesday evening adult education, we will be exploring moments of continuity and change and seeing the way that there does not have to be competition between these two things. We will do so by looking at several episodes of the Old Testament with the overarching question, "Is this a new way of being religious?" We will discover that the answer is both yes and no. Yes, this is something that had not been done before – as it reflects a reality that was not before, but also no – this new thing fits with what had always been done due to the continuity of our God. We will be exploring this topic in the Old Testament not just as an academic exercise, but as a relevant question for us today. What are the new things we do in our worship life that are in continuity with the past yet also change? What are places we are challenged for change while remaining in continuity? Can we see continuity and change in coordination rather than competition? Join us on Tuesdays as we consider and explore those questions for our lives today.

#### **BOOK CLUB NEWS**

The CLC Book Club will meet via Zoom on Monday, January 8, 2024, at 7:00pm to discuss *The Beauty of Dusk: on Vision Lost and Found* by Frank Bruni. One morning *New York Times* columnist Frank Bruni woke up with strangely blurred vision. He wondered at first if some goo or gunk had worked its way into his right eye. But this was no fleeting annoyance, no fixable inconvenience. Overnight, a rare stroke had cut off

blood to one of his optic nerves, rendering him functionally blind in that eye—forever. And he soon learned from doctors that the same disorder could ravage his left eye, too. He could lose his sight altogether. In this memoir, Bruni recounts his adjustment to this daunting reality, a medical and spiritual odyssey that involved not only reappraising his own priorities but also reaching out to, and gathering wisdom from, longtime friends and new acquaintances who had navigated their own traumas and afflictions. The discussion will be led by Ginger Bopp.

Looking Ahead: The CLC Book Club will meet via Zoom on Monday, February 12, 2024, at 7:00pm to discuss *Lady Tan's Circle of Women* by Lisa See. Born into an elite family at the beginning of the 15th century Ming Dynasty, Tan Yunzian is taught medicine by her grandmother, one of a handful of female doctors in all of China. An underlying theme is not only how she worked within the system controlled by her mother-in-law and men, but also succeeded in becoming proficient in medicine. One learns about the difficulty of befriending outside your class, practicing an art controlled by men, and the fascinating and painful footbinding process. The discussion will be led by Arlene Dietz.

The Church Council met on Dec. 20, 2023

#### **Action Items:**

- 1. The Council set the Semi-Annual Congregational Meeting to be Sunday, Jan. 28 between services.
- 2. Council unanimously endorsed the Oregon Synod Letter of Intent for Deacon Clare's proposed shared call with Emmaus. The Letter of Intent will be voted upon by the congregation at the Semi-Annual meeting.
- 3. Council endorses increased salary for Lindsay Rodgers for music together and children's choir for 2024.
- 4. Regarding Endowment fund:
- a. Council approves the allocation of funds as per the distribution policies of the CLC Endowment funds and recommended by the Endowment committee of \$20,425 (\$20,328 is 3% minimum distribution amount).
- b. Council approves the extension of the expiration date of the previous Endowment grant 21-017 from 1/26/24 to 5/4/24. This allows for the appropriate use of these allocated funds.
- 5. Council approved the pastors housing allowance.
- 6. Council approved the proposal for the 2024 St. Cecelia Fund budget of \$10,960 for music outreach.
