AN INTRODUCTION TO TODAY'S WORSHIP

Throughout the ages, wealthy patrons and congregations frequently marked important occasions in their history by commissioning works of art, whether it be a piece of sculpture, an altar painting, a stained-glass window for their church, or a musical setting of the liturgical service for chorus, soloists and orchestra by a great composer which could be sung on special occasions. The body of liturgical masses, of which Mozart's **Missa Solemnis** is one, falls into this category. From a practical point of view, only the textual portions of the service, which are generally constant week by week, were included in these settings. These sections, the **Ordinary of the Mass**, are: the **Kyrie** [plea to the Lord for mercy] and **Gloria** [Glory to God], the **Creed** [statement of Faith], and in the Eucharist [Thanksgiving...referring to Holy Communion]: the **Sanctus** [Holy, Holy, Holy] and **Agnus Dei** [Lamb of God]. The Lessons and other portions of the service, which change weekly, were never included which made these settings more versatile.

The texts of the **Ordinary** are drawn from the Bible and other religious sources. The **Kyrie**, **Gloria** (the song the Angels sang announcing Christ's birth that first Christmas Eve) and **Sanctus** (circa 120 A.D.) date from the earliest centuries of the Christian Era; the **Creed**, and **Agnus Dei** were in place within the Christian service by 800 A.D. These sections are spaced throughout the service as the liturgical journey to Holy Communion progresses and were originally sung to Gregorian Chant. The movements or sections of the mass were never composed to be sung together consecutively as a unit as one hears in modern performances in concert halls.

During the weekly services at Central Lutheran Church and other liturgical churches—Lutheran, Episcopalian/Anglican and Roman Catholic—these texts of the **Ordinary of the Mass** are sung as our way of reaching out to worship the King of Kings. It is not a rigid ritual that we aimlessly and mindlessly follow, but something that has meaning to us nowadays and enriches our lives. Today, it is fitting, therefore, that we present this setting

of the mass as our offering of worship to God. Most masses nowadays are sung in concert halls; we are pleased to bring this masterpiece back to its original setting, Divine Worship.

Born in 1756, Mozart was commissioned to compose a great deal of music for the church during his short life of thirty-five years. In 1781 when Mozart was 24 years old, Missa Solemnis was the complete mass that he wrote following the success of his beloved Coronation Mass. Both the Great Mass in C Minor and his Requiem were left unfinished at his death. The title, Missa Solemnis (Solemn Mass), is misleading. One might expect a dark and mournful piece—quite the contrary, it is full of joy and exuberant celebration. "Solemn Mass" refers to the occasion for which this mass would be used, not just a regular Sunday, but a solemn or festive day. It was likely composed for a festive service in Salzburg Cathedral in Austria on Easter Sunday in 1780, hence it employs the "festive" orchestra which adds two oboes, two bassoons, two trumpets, three trombones and timpani to the standard Mozart string orchestra. Mozart does a magnificent job of composing a work at the level that one would expect to hear on Easter. Like many of the masses that we have presented at Central, this one is supremely beautiful and lyrical in sections. Other sections powerfully proclaim the majesty, mystery and glory of God.
